This Christmastide we have a number of special services across our three hubs and hope that we can all celebrate the good news that Christmas brings, and also take time out to remember those we have lost in our 'Time to remember' event. My prayer is that all Montrose folk have a blessed Christmas and that in the year to come we can hold on to the promise from God that he never leaves us nor forsakes us.

LOOKING BACK AND MOVING FORWARD STEEPLE ROOMS REFURBISHED.

When we suddenly and tragically lost our good friend Willie Sinclair last year, it was decided that it would be a fitting tribute to him to revamp the old Session Room at the Steeple Hub and rename it the '**Sinclair Room**'. At the same time, it was recognised that an upgrade to the Vestry would make it a much more comfortable and welcoming space for our new Ministry Team to work from.



STEEPLE VESTRY

The old rooms have served us well for the last 50 years, but with new Health & Safety regulations to consider in the Vestry, and a desire to create a multi-purpose cosy space that Willie would have approved of, we started with new lighting, and a heating system that can be set remotely, then followed up with new colour schemes. Carpet tiles have been replaced with new hard-wearing carpets, and a mix of comfortable and office style furniture sourced for both rooms. Soft furnishings have been added to create a homely feel thanks to some generous donations.

Going forward, the hope is that our ministers and youth worker will use the Vestry as a base, getting the church doors open more often and letting the people of Montrose know that Montrose Trinity is an active, welcoming place.

Let's hope there are kettles in both rooms?

The Sinclair Room has been furnished to be an informal, multi-purpose space that can be used practically for Sunday School, Sunday business, and small meetings, but also a cosy space where families preparing for funerals or those wanting to speak to the ministers can feel relaxed and comfortable.

And its nice welcoming soft sofas are always there for hard working church volunteers to sink into – we think Willie would approve!



Even if you're not in the habit of going into either room, please pop in on a Sunday or any time you see the church door ajar – all are welcome here any day of the week.

VIVID VISION—LISTENING TO OUR CHURCH FAMILY

In September we held a 'Vivid Vision' session with over 50 members attending, where Very Rev Dr Martin Fair facilitated reflections on where we are as a church today and what we hope for the future. The responses revealed both honest concerns and deep faith in God's renewing power. The responses were all analysed and some main themes emerged.

Many expressed sadness at our **declining and ageing membership**, and the need to **reconnect with young families and children**.



There was also a clear desire to rebuild a stronger link between **church and community**, ensuring our worship and witness remain relevant and rooted in everyday life.

Participants voiced frustration with bureaucracy and slow change, longing instead for greater local **freedom, joy, and shared purpose**. Yet through every challenge ran a hopeful thread: a belief that the **Holy Spirit is at work**, stirring revival and calling us to renewed mission.

The vision for Montrose Trinity is becoming clearer — a **welcoming, outward-looking church** that serves its community, embraces **unity** across our three hubs, and invites all generations to worship and grow together. Focus on 'Growing Young' movement, flexible worship spaces, and renewed personal commitment to **prayer and discipleship** were seen as keys to moving forward. At a follow up evening was arranged for early November. The next step will be to get to know one another more deeply in January as we explore our shared values.

Renewal begins with each of us — praying, serving, and stepping out in faith as we journey together toward a vibrant, Spirit-filled future.

We do need to look at different formats, different venues and different times in order to recover the younger generations, though there are green shoots— as shown overleaf.

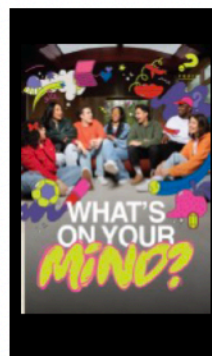
SUMMER HOLIDAY CLUBS

AND FOR ME, IT'S TIME TO GO.

It seems a long time ago now, but time passes so quickly....too quickly; It was 1997 when I began my three year Readership studies with The Scottish Churches Open College.....which included two six month placements....one at a rural charge, Glamis with Andrew Greave, the other in a town church, St Andrews, Arbroath, with Martin Fair.

On completion, at the turn of the century, I was "Set Apart" as a Church of Scotland Reader in The Old Kirk....Martin Fair preached and Lawrence Whitley, the then of

Angus Presbytery conducted the formal proceedings.

I had been for many years, very involved in the Old Kirk as an Elder, but now found myself very busy in other churches leading worship and fulfilling Locum duties where and when required.

But I always felt something was missing from my ministry, which was highlighted during my year as moderator of Angus Presbytery.....Under Church Law I was not permitted to conduct Communion.....that required an ordained minister, so I had to vacate the moderators seat during the Presbytery Communion Service.

However, in 2011 things began to change....the Church opened the door for Readers to be ordained as OLMs.....Ordained Local Ministers.....After a further year of study with Aberdeen University I awaited my ordination date. It arrived by E-Mail....27th August 2013....

I immediately gave Celia a shout....she came running....I commented that the date was familiar for some reason....then, after recovering from a dead arm, Celia reminded me that the 27th of August was our anniversary date. **OOPS!**

And so I was ordained as an OLM in Edzell Church on my Pearl Wedding Anniversary. Jane Blackley preached that day, she spoke of the "Call of God" saying we are all called and asked ministers to remove their clerical

I was wearing mine for the first time....I whispered to Celia, "I have waited 50 years for this moment, I'm keeping mine on"...and I did.

Unbelievably, twelve years have come and gone already, and I say this from the bottom of my heart ordained or not.... It has been a joy and privilege to serve my God and the people of God here in this community and around Angus....But everything comes to an end.....And, for me, it's time to go!

May the Lord richly bless you, and all that you do for him.
